2015-2016 HIGHLIGHTS

- ❖ **523** students participated in international study, internships and volunteer programs in **51** countries
- ❖ **35%** of study abroad students participated in Faculty-led, short-term programs
- ❖ Top 5 Destinations include: **Mexico, France, Spain, Italy, Germany**
- ❖ **New Education Abroad Sponsored Model**, which will offer more than 70 programs, compared to six in previous years, allows the use of institutional scholarships toward international sponsored program costs, beginning Fall 2016

EDUCATION ABROAD PROGRAMS

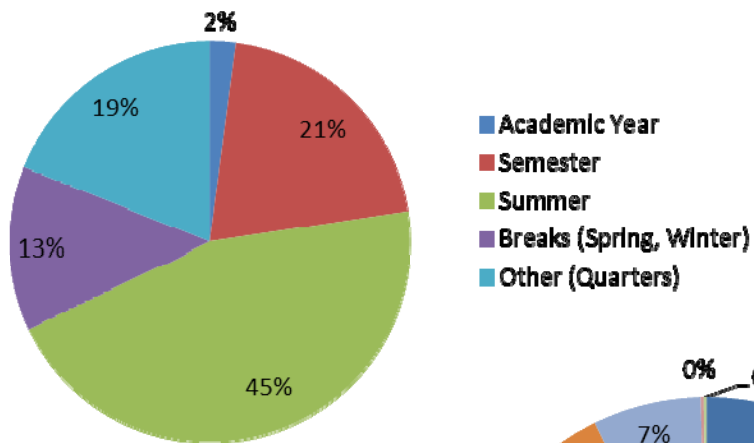

International programs at Seattle University are divided into five categories:

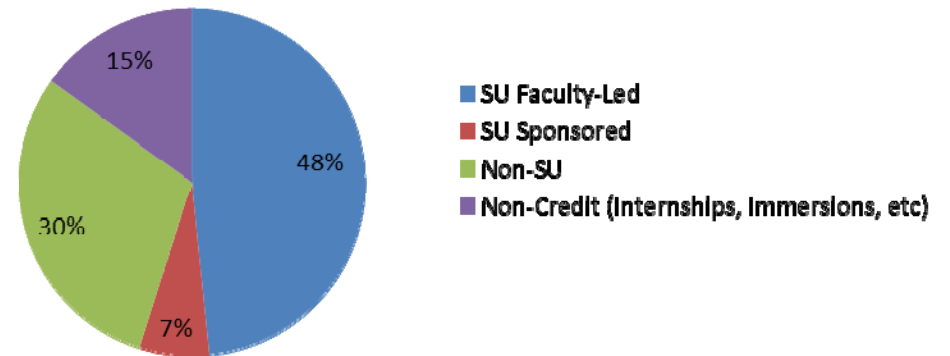

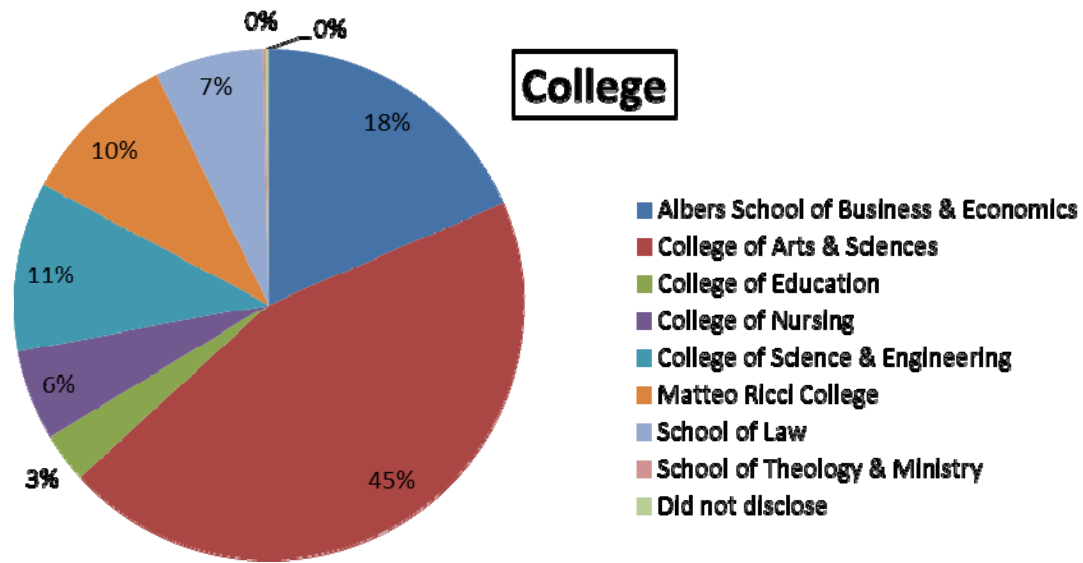
Academic Term



Program Type



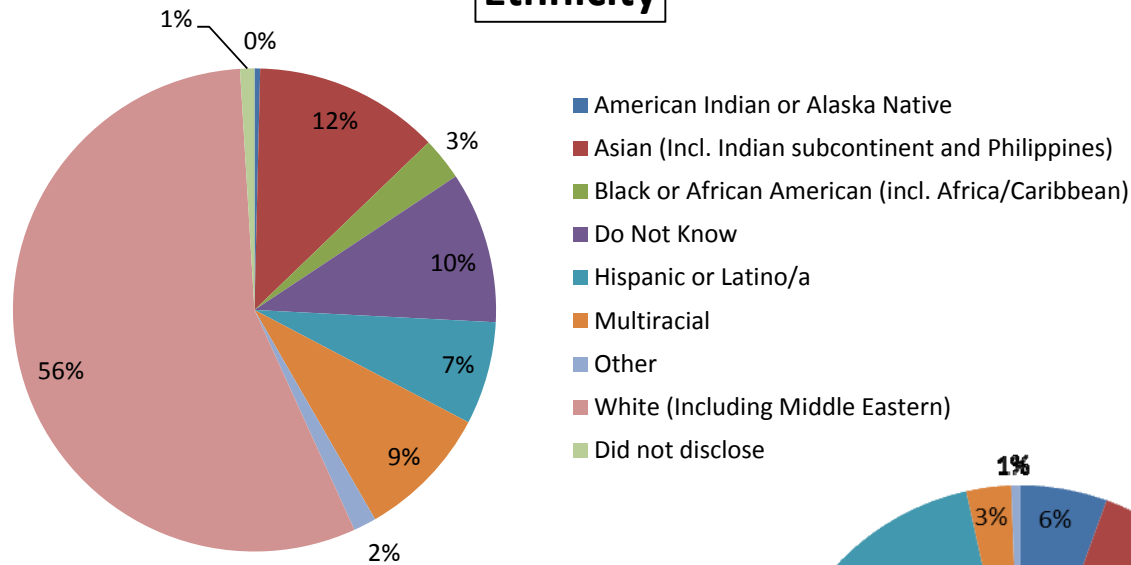

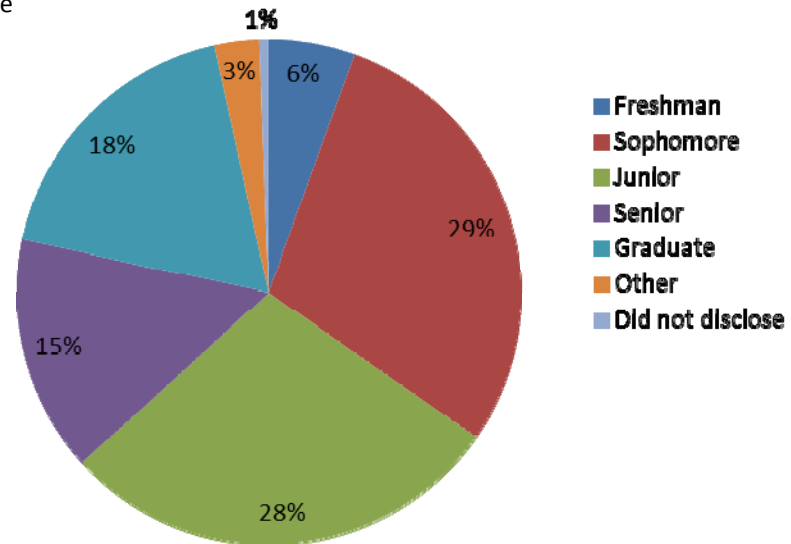

Ethnicity

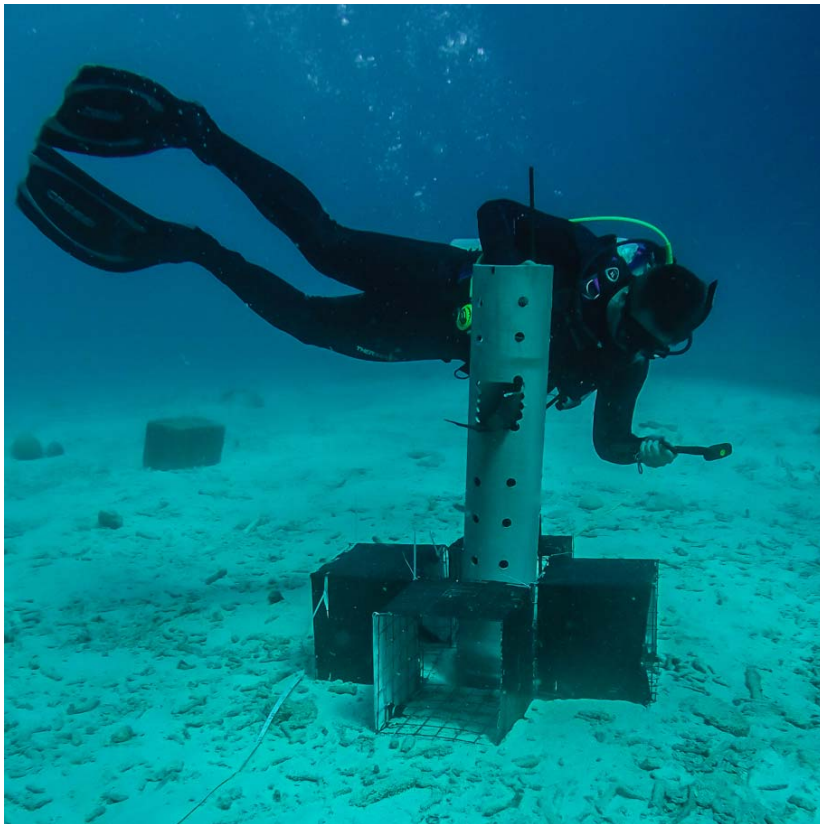


Academic Level
