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About CCTS

The Center for Change in Transition Services (CCTS) envisions a world where all individuals live with independence and self-sufficiency. Our mission is to improve post-school outcomes (PSO) for students with disabilities. We work to achieve this mission by creating broader visibility for quality data and robust research, informing policy, supporting effective teaching and learning, and maintaining critical partnerships and connections in the area of special education.

CCTS is one of five state needs projects funded through the Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI), Special Education section, using Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) state-level discretionary funds. Collectively, the Washington State Needs Projects provide statewide professional development, technical assistance, consultation, and training for educators, parents and families.

Indicator 14 and the Post-School Survey

IDEA is a federal statute pertaining to youth and young adults ages 3-21 who receive special education and/or related services. Washington state collects and reports on 17 IDEA indicators of effectiveness to the Office for Special Education Programs (OSEP).

Of the 17 indicators, four relate to secondary transition. These four indicators are also tied to the Local Education Agency (LEA) Application for Federal Funds for Special Education:

- Indicator 1: Graduation rates
- Indicator 2: Dropout rates
- Indicator 13: Post-school transition goals in the IEP
- Indicator 14: Participation in postsecondary education or employment one year after graduation

The annual Post-School Survey is used to gather and report post-school outcome data to OSEP in response to Indicator 14. PSO data are collected not only for reporting, but for continuous programmatic improvement.

Conducting the Post-School Survey

The Post-School Survey is administered from June 1 to November 1 each year. School district personnel conduct the survey by making phone calls to students ages 16-21 with an Individual Education Program (IEP) one year after the students graduated or permanently exited high school.

Data are collected in the following areas:

- Demographic categories (e.g. gender, disability, race/ethnicity)
- Work and school experiences
- Type of job or school
- Number of hours working or in school
- Contact with agencies

Survey data are recorded in the Transition Systemic Framework 2.0 (TSF2), CCTS's secure online data collection platform. CCTS analyzes these data and produces district, ESD, and state-level reports.

Commonly Used Terms

These definitions are specific to the reporting requirements for IDEA Part B.

Leaver: Youth ages 16 and older with an IEP who left school by graduating with a diploma, aging out, dropping out, or who were expected to return and did not.

- **Graduated:** Exit category for all leavers who left school with a diploma.
- Dropped Out: Exit category for all leavers who left school without a diploma. This includes students who aged out or received an adult HS diploma or GED.

Responder/Respondent: Young adult leavers or their designated family member who answered the Post-School Survey interview questions.

Any Engagement: Broad term for leavers who meet reporting requirements for one of the following PSO categories: Higher Education, Competitive Employment, Other Education/ Training, Other Employment.

No Engagement: PSO category where leavers do not meet reporting requirements for any engagement categories.

Higher Education: PSO category where leavers are enrolled full- or part-time, in a (two-year) community college or (four- or more year) college/university program, for at least one complete term at any time in the first year since leaving high school.

Competitive Employment: PSO category where leavers have worked for pay at or above the minimum wage in a setting with others who are nondisabled for 20 hours a week or more for at least 90 days at any time in the year since leaving high school. This includes military employment.

Other Education/Training: PSO category where leavers are enrolled full- or part-time for at least one complete term in an education or training program at any time in the first year since leaving high school (e.g., Job Corps, adult education, workforce development program, or vocational technical school which is less than a two-year program).

Other Employment: PSO category where leavers have worked for pay or been self-employed for at least 90 days at any time in the first year since leaving high school. This includes working in a family business (e.g., farm, store, fishing, ranching, catering services, etc.).

Breaking Down Post-School Outcome Data by Engagement





Figure 1: Breaking down PSO data by engagement

The following pages include a series of PSO bar charts, line charts, and data tables for all respondents in Washington state. Figure 1 helps illustrate the sequence of information.

First, state-level data are displayed for all respondents in the **five PSO categories** (Higher Education, Competitive Employment, Other Education/Training, Other Employment, and No Engagement).

Then data are broken down by **Any Engagement** and **No Engagement** within the categories of Exit Status, Gender, Disability, Race/Ethnicity, and Five-Year Overview.

Finally, **Any Engagement** is further broken down into the **four PSO engagement categories** (Higher Education, Competitive Employment, Other Education/Training, and Other Employment).

Post-School Outcomes for all Respondents

Table 1 shows the total number of leavers in Washington, and the percentage of those leavers who completed the Post-School Survey. Chart 1 and Table 2 show the percentages of respondents in each of the five postschool outcome categories: Higher Education, Competitive Employment, Other Education/Training, Other Employment, and No Engagement.





Engagement Outcomes by Exit Categories






Chart 10: Higher Education by Gender Categories

Chart 11: Competitive Employment by Gender Categories




Chart 12: Other Education/Training by Gender Categories




Chart 14: Any Engagement by Disability Categories








Chart 22: Higher Education by Race/Ethnicity Categories

Chart 23: Competitive Employment by Race/Ethnicity Categories




Chart 24: Other Education/Training by Race/Ethnicity Categories

Any Engagement vs. No Engagement, Five-Year Overview




Chart 26: Any Engagement Five-Year Overview




Chart 27: No Engagement Five-Year Overview




Chart 28: Higher Education Five-Year Overview

Other Education/Training Washington state, 2016-17




Chart 30: Other Education/Training Five-Year Overview

Competitive Employment Washington state, 2016-17




Chart 29: Competitive Employment Five-Year Overview

Other Employment Washington state, 2016-17




Chart 31: Other Employment Five-Year Overview
