DR. MO-KYUNG SIN

AWARDED NATIONAL INSTITUTES OF HEALTH GRANTS, INDUCTED AS FELLOW OF THE GERONTOLOGICAL SOCIETY OF AMERICA

ssociate Professor of Nursing, Mo-Kyung Sin, PhD, RN, FGSA, has been granted over \$556,000 in federal funding to pursue her research through the National Institutes of Health (NIH) National Institute on Aging as part of the Small Research Grant Program for the Next Generation of Researchers in Alzheimer's Disease and Alzheimer's Disease-Related Dementias.

Dr. Sin's awards from the NIH, join only five previous NIH-funded awards and sub-awards made to Seattle University in the last decade and demonstrate the continued growth and evolution of SU's research enterprise.

Dr. Sin's outstanding work and continued dedication to the field of gerontology recently earned her the honor of being selected as a Fellow of the Gerontological Society of America (GSA)—the highest class of membership within the society. This year, she was also elected as national chair of the GSA's Health Sciences Section and will serve in this leadership position for 4 years.

"This is an exciting opportunity for Dr. Sin who has meticulously studied and sought mentorship to move her scholarship in the direction of aging and dementia research," said Dean Kristen Swanson.

Since joining SU in 2004, Dr. Sin has consistently pursued her research into the influence of cardiovascular disease on the development of neurodegenerative diseases, such as Alzheimer's disease and Parkinson's disease. In 2019.



she was selected for the distinguished Edmond J. Safra Visiting Nurse Faculty Program at the Parkinson's Foundation and has since received the program's 2021 Alumni Award for her outstanding contribution in educating others and nursing students on Parkinson disease.

A strong advocate for student success, Dr. Sin has mentored both nursing students and alumni through the Parkinson Disease Nursing Student Ambassador Program, which she implemented in

2020 with funding from the Parkinson's Foundation. She expanded the current program in 2021 to the Alzheimer Disease and Parkinson Disease Ambassador Program with a seed grant from the College of Nursing. The ambassador programs were designed to provide nursing students with necessary knowledge and competency when caring for patients with Alzheimer disease and/or Parkinson disease and evidence-based practice skills through case-study manuscript development.

With support from the NIH, Dr. Sin continues her study of the relationship between blood pressure, cerebral vasculopathies (abnormal blood vessels: cerebral amyloid angiopathy, arteriolosclerosis) and region-specific cerebral microinfarcts (microscopic tissue infarction/necrosis of the brain) and their influence on the development of dementia.

To do so, she will use data from the Adult Changes in Thought (ACT) study, a longitudinal dataset collected by Kaiser Permanente (KP) and the University of Washington since 1996 that follows KP patients throughout their lives. Ultimately, her research will contribute to foundational knowledge about possible mechanisms for preventing or delaying dementia in older adults, including interventions aimed at proper monitoring and treatment of blood pressure.

NAMED ROBERT WOOD JOHNSON FOUNDATION HEALTH POLICY FELLOW BY THE NATIONAL ACADEMY OF MEDICINE

umhee Ro, DNP, ARNP, FAANP, Assistant
Professor of Nursing, was named one of
only six health care professionals across the
country for the 2022-2023 class of Robert
Wood Johnson Foundation (RWJF) Health
Policy Fellows, administered by the National
Academy of Medicine (NAM).

Ro will spend a year-long fellowship in Washington, D.C., participating in the policy process at the federal level. The RWJF Health Policy Fellows were competitively selected from highly accomplished national health, behavioral and social science professionals who have an interest in policy.

"I am tremendously honored and humbled by this opportunity to learn at the highest level of policy to build equitable health care through the nursing workforce," said Ro. "I hope to use this invaluable experience to promote social justice and improve health care access for our underserved populations."

The fellowship program will commence with an intensive three-month orientation by the National Academy of Medicine, followed by a nine-month assignment in a congressional office, on a committee or in the executive branch, where the fellows will be involved in health-related legislation and programs.

"During this time of turbulence in health care, Dr. Ro will be in Washington, D.C., working to improve federal policies. We are so proud of Dr. Ro and look forward to the great skills she will bring back to lead the nursing profession in redressing inequitable access to high quality health care for all," said Dean Kristen Swanson.

Ro's scholarship has focused on identifying factors supporting diversity within the health care workforce as a means of promoting care and outcomes for traditionally marginalized populations.

Rev. Michael J. Garanzini, S.J., president of the Association of Jesuit College and Universities' (AJCU), said, "AJCU is grateful for the leadership of Dr. Ro, co-founder of the Jesuit Diverse Nursing Faculty Network. Through her work, faculty at nursing schools across the country now have opportunities for greater support, as well as professional development, in nursing."

The Fellows' experience in Washington, D.C. will position them to examine how federal and state governments relate to the mission of their home institutions and will enrich their understanding of the federal policy formation process. Fellows are expected to use the experiences, leadership skills, and relationships gained through the experience to advance health care policy and equity at the national, state, and/or local levels.

"Every day for the past two and a half years, we have been reminded about how public health and health care impact our daily lives and sense of security," said Gregg Margolis, director of the RWJF Health Policy Fellows program at the National Academy of Medicine. "These exceptional health and health care experts will bring to Washington, D.C. experience that enriches the policy process and adds a 'front line' perspective to policy discussions. This amazing cohort will help shape health decisions that impact us all."

According to the press release, the RWJF Health Policy Fellows program is the nation's most prestigious learning experience at the nexus of health, science, and policy in Washington, D.C. Since 1973, this nonpartisan fellowship has offered exclusive, hands-on policy experience with the most influential congressional and executive offices in the nation's capital. Over 300 fellows from across the nation have worked hand in hand with the best and brightest in federal health policy to gain an insider's perspective of the political process, develop unmatched leadership skills, and build a professional network that lasts a lifetime.



NURSING PROGRAM

RE-ACCREDITED FOR 10 YEARS

he Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE) has re-accredited the Seattle University College of Nursing baccalaureate degree program in nursing for 10 years, extending its accreditation to December 31, 2032.

The program was reviewed by the CCNE Board of Commissioners using the CCNE Standards for Accreditation of Baccalaureate and Graduate Nursing Programs (2018). The Board determined that the program met all four accreditation standards and additionally determined that there were no compliance concerns with respect to the key elements.

"We were delighted when CCNE site visitors affirmed the high quality of our traditional and transfer BSN programs and the Advanced Practice Nursing Immersion/BSN portion of the DNP curriculum," said Dean Kristen Swanson.

The Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) program at SU is among the oldest nursing programs in Washington. Since its inception it has prepared 5,931 BSN prepared registered nurses to lead and transform care systems from a foundation of Jesuit values and social justice.

Seattle University College of Nursing has long offered opportunities for those pursuing their first health care career and for current health care professionals to expand their scope of practice. Study options include baccalaureate

programs in both nursing and diagnostic ultrasound, as well as a full complement of advanced practice nursing specialties, including DNP and Post Graduate Certificate programs for Adult-Gerontology Acute Care Nurse Practitioner, Adult-Gerontology Primary Care Nurse Practitioner, Family Nurse Practitioner, Family Psychiatric Mental Health Nurse Practitioner, and Nurse-Midwifery.

Over the last three years, the College of Nursing has invited CCNE, Accreditation Commission for Midwifery Education (ACME), and the Washington State Department of Health's Nursing Care Quality Assurance Commission (NCQAC) to review our programs of study. The CON has received the maximum ten years of accreditation from CCNE and ACME and has been recognized for alignment with the Washington State Nursing Education regulations by NCQAC.

The baccalaureate degree program in nursing/Doctor of Nursing Practice program and post-graduate APRN certificate program at Seattle University is accredited by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (http://www.ccneaccreditation.org).

The Seattle University, College of Nursing, Nurse-Midwifery, Doctor of Nursing Practice program is accredited by the Accreditation Commission for Midwifery Education (ACME), 8403 Colesville Road, Suite 1550, Silver Spring, MD 20910; 240-485-1802, www.midwife.org/acme. The Midwifery program is accredited through October 31, 2031.

ast year Luth M. Tenorio, Dean Emerita of SU College of Nursing graciously endowed the College of Nursing Dean's Annual Lecture. In her honor, the lecture is now named, the "Dr. Luth M. Tenorio College of Nursing Dean's Endowed Lectureship."

Dr. Tenorio was instrumental in the initial establishment of the annual lecture, which represents a commitment to bringing together the College of Nursing and the community, to hear from nursing and other health care leaders and engage participants in discussions on topics that are meaningful to nursing and health care. Through her generosity, in perpetuity, the college will be able to invite national and international nursing and health experts to campus.

In 2022, the college was honored to welcome Coretta Jenerette, PhD, RN, AOCN, CNE, ANEF, FAAN, Professor and Associate Dean for Diversity, Equity, & Inclusivity at University of South Carolina College of Nursing as the

inaugural Dr. Luth M. Tenorio College of Nursing Dean's Endowed Lecturer.

In her lecture, "Social Justice Advocacy—Necessary Trouble," Dr. Jenerette used examples from her research and the literature to define and explore social justice advocacy as a necessity for health equity. Dr. Jenerette was drawn to this research as a staff nurse when she witnessed the disparities in pain management as lived by those who lived with sickle cell disease and the inequities in care that were fueled by social determinants of health. Dr. Jenerette is a servant leader, exquisite nurse scientist, and social justice advocate.

Many alumni, faculty, staff, and students were in attendance for the lecture, which invited audience members to discern where they are on the social justice advocacy continuum. Her exploration of social justice advocacy as a necessity for health equity was enlightening and provoked great conversation between those in attendance and Dr. Jenerette.

NEW AWARDS FROM THE HEARST FOUNDATION AND WASHINGTON STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT COUNCIL PROVIDE CRITICAL SUPPORT FOR THE

CLINICAL PERFORMANCE LAB



he College of Nursing (CON), under the leadership of Dr. Carrie Miller, Associate Dean for Innovations in Clinical Education, was awarded \$480,000 in grant funding from the Washington Student Achievement Council (WSAC) and The Hearst Foundation in support of the CON Clinical Performance Lab (CPL). Funding will provide critical support to the CPL in clinical education of students through simulation-based scenarios facilitated by experienced faculty-clinicians.

"Learning in a simulated clinical environment provides nursing students with a safe and effective opportunity to exercise clinical judgement, practice therapeutic communication and master hands-on skills," says Dean Kristen Swanson. "Seattle University College of Nursing is grateful for the Hearst Foundation and the Washington Student Achievement Council's investment in simulated nursing education."

Dr. Carrie Miller echoed the sentiments of Dean Swanson: "The CPL team will use the grant monies to address two specific learning needs of CON students—high-fidelity manikins for a state-of-the-art simulation space and trained actors to increase the realism of simulations. The goal of the CPL is to provide students with the opportunity to practice

communication skills, prioritization and caring behaviors in a safe learning environment."

The \$280,000 in WSAC funds will support the purchase of nine new simulation manikins, enabling replacement of aging manikins, expanding learning opportunities for realistic, standardized, clinical scenarios, and increasing the number of manikins for health assessment and skills courses.

Funds in the amount of \$200,000 from The Hearst Foundation will further enhance the CPL by facilitating new simulated learning programs focused on emotionally—and technically—complex nursing care, culturally-aware communication, and setting priorities within a team-based approach. The grant will support simulation scenarios that employ ethnically-diverse trained actors as standardized patients and embedded family members. Simulated relationship-based care enables richer just-in-time coaching in patient and family centered-care than is possible through clinical experiences.

With this critical funding the CPL team will have resources needed to significantly enhance evidence-based simulation experiences that guide students in translating theoretical knowledge into clinical competence that is responsive to diversity, equity, and inclusionary considerations.

PRATISTHA KHAREL

ROSEMARY FORD FUTURE OF ONCOLOGY NURSING SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENT

Pratistha Kharel, a junior in the Bachelor of Science in Nursing program at Seattle University, was among the 2022 recipients of the Rosemary Ford Future of Oncology Nursing Scholarship awarded by the Seattle Cancer Care Alliance (SCCA).

Kharel and her family came to the United States from Nepal where they experienced political instability and poverty living in one small household. A turning point in her life involved the failure of local spiritual shamanist practices to cure the illness of her uncle who lived in the same household. Her uncle's untimely passing from gallbladder cancer within three days of diagnosis was as shocking

as it was life changing for her. It made her decide to pursue a career in health care to prevent similar situations from happening to others in her family and beyond.

"SU's mission to improve health care for greater equality and an ethical society aligns with my life purpose and makes it the ideal school for me," said Kharel. She demonstrates her commitment to caring for vulnerable and underserved people as a personal care worker for elderly at a local long-term and as a volunteer at other long-term facilities interacting with residents who speak Hindu and Nepali languages, which she speaks fluently in addition to English. Kharel took time to share more about her life experiences and goals.

Tell us a little about yourself and your experiences.

I am a first-generation student from a rural village in Nepal who immigrated to the U.S. at the age of 13. I grew up in a multi-generational family where I cared for my aging grandparents and younger cousins while my parents worked. In my village, modern health care was a luxury rather than a necessity due to limited access, illiteracy, and expense.

Attending school in the U.S. was an opportunity I especially appreciated, since not all girls had the chance to finish high



school or hold jobs in Nepal. This experience shaped my perspective. It made me want to learn everything as best I could and, as soon as I turned 16, I got my first paying job.

My unpaid work, as a new immigrant with parents experiencing a language barrier, included caring for my younger sibling, preparing meals while my parents worked, and translating my homework into English before completing my assignments late into the evening. These challenges made me the person I am today, confident and capable of overcoming any obstacle that comes my way.

What drew you to pursue your BSN at SU?

SU's mission to improve health care for

greater equality and an ethical society aligns with my life purpose and makes it the ideal school for me. The Clinical Performance Lab, with its life-like, high fidelity mannequins, offers excellent preparation. Additionally, the small class size in the cohort group provides students with a more personal learning experience and opportunities for collaboration. SU's outstanding program will enable me to treat future immigrant families in a community health clinic and empower them to advocate for their health care rights.

What are your plans/career goals after you graduate?

In the future, after earning my BSN degree and gaining valuable clinical experience, I intend to return to Nepal and open primary health care clinics in remote areas to expand access to modern health care, annual check-ups, and cancer screening and care. I also intend to give back to my community by working in a public health clinic to benefit underserved populations and empower women to have control over their own health. As our population becomes increasingly more diverse, my intercultural knowledge will benefit the patients I serve in my community. I hope to become a mentor to other first-generation women of color to lift them up and encourage their success.


practitioner students who seek to 'skill-up', expand their knowledge of the management of acutely ill individuals, and obtain certification as an AG-ACNP. The program also accepts APNI (Advanced Practice Nursing Immersion) and BSN prepared nurses who seek their Doctor of Nursing Practice degree. The AG-ACNP specialty coursework is offered in an executive format which has made it very accessible for working students.

In his role at SU, Dr. Miller has been a trusted mentor and advisor to many graduate students. In 2020, he provided advising for over 107 students in the Family Nurse Practitioner (FNP) and AG-ACNP programs. He has also developed a comprehensive Objective Structured Clinical Examination (OSCE) program for NP students and helped to develop post-graduate fellowship programs.

As a highly accomplished clinician, Dr. Miller precepts

Sigma Theta Tau. He has written nine book chapters for Banasik's well-regarded textbook entitled, Pathophysiology (7th Edition). As principal investigator or co-investigator, he has received funding in amounts ranging from \$500 to \$450,000 for 14 different projects with the majority focused on training and clinical improvements. In June 2020, he was inducted as a Fellow of the American Association of Nurse Practitioners (FAANP).

The Dr. Lester and Mary Ann Sauvage Endowed Professorship was originally endowed as the Hope Heart Institute Endowed Professorship in Cardiovascular Nursing. On November 18, 2015, the Professorship was renamed in honor of Dr. and Mrs. Sauvage, and the agreement was amended and broadened to focus on wellness, disease prevention, and health promotion to help individuals maintain heart health and reduce their risk for cardiac disease.
