Departmental Update



ENROLLMENT/STUDENT INTEREST

We begin the 2025-2026 academic year with 344 students- 261 undergraduate students, 83 graduate students. In the undergraduate program, the BA in Criminal Justice and Criminology is the most popular specialization with 94 students (36% of all CJ undergrads) followed by BA/BS Forensic Psychology with 83 students (32% of all CJ undergrads), BS Forensic Science with 53 students (20% of CJ undergrads), and BCJCR Law with 28 students (11% of all CJ Undergrads), and BACJCR/MA with 1 student. The most popular graduate program specializations are Investigative Criminology with 35 students (42% of MACJ students) followed by MACJ-No Specialization with

We recognize that the academic discipline of criminal justice, criminology, and forensics cannot be taught in the "ivory tower." Collaboration with our Crime & Justice Advisory Committee makes it possible to offer students out-of-classroom experiential learning opportunities through Crime & Justice Research Center collaborations, practicum courses, research analyst/assistantships, CJ Honor Society and Club events, and classroom field visits. In

2024-25, students visited the WA DSHS Special **Commitment Center in** McNeil Island, WA DOC **Monroe Correctional** Complex/Twin Rivers, met with formerly incarcerated from The IF Project, toured the King County Medical Examiner's Office, participated in the **One** Seattle Day of Service in Rainier Beach, and participated in a **Restorative Community-**Police Dialogue Circle with Seattle Police.
