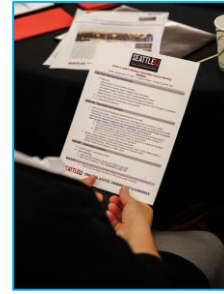

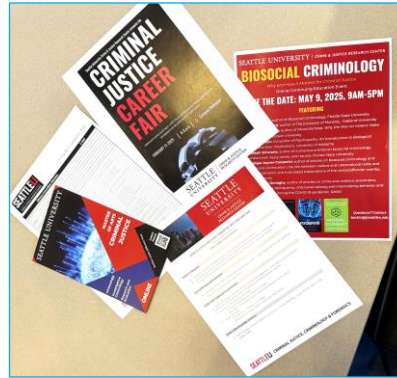


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Recap of last year's CJ Advisory Committee Meetings

Ben Whiteaker is pursuing a BA in Forensic Psychology and plans to graduate June 2026. Ben is interested in the impact of policies and practices at intersection of mental health and criminal justice on justice-involved individuals and in working in mental health counseling with incarcerated individuals, especially youth in Washington State. Ben is also interested in trauma informed policing, police wellness, and the need for police to understand both their own mental health and the people's their interacting with on the streets. Ben currently serves as a Research Analyst with the Seattle Police Department's Before the Badge Evaluation responsible for notetaking in interviews with Seattle Police recruits and officers on the impact of police training. Ben's career goal is to work in the intersection of mental health and criminal justice in the Washington State Department of Children Youth & Families Juvenile Rehabilitation or Department of Corrections. They plan to pursue his master's in counseling with hope to become a mental health professional working in juvenile and/or adult corrections. Their own experiences with mental health and trauma guide and inform their work and help them connect and empathize with those they will work with. They believe that juvenile justice needs to be trauma informed, and that rehabilitation and restoration happens at the intersection of mental health and criminal justice.

1. A person who unlawfully delivers a controlled substance in violation of RCW 69.50.401(2) (a), (b), or (c) which controlled substance is subsequently used by the person to whom it was delivered, resulting in the death of the user, is guilty of controlled substances homicide.
2. Controlled substances homicide is a class B to chapter 9A.20
