


BLUME CJ SCHOLAR

- A person who unlawfully delivers a controlled substance in violation of RCW 69.50.401(2) (a), (b), or (c) which controlled substance is subsequently used by the person to whom it was delivered, resulting in the death of the user, is guilty of controlled substances homicide.
- 2. Controlled substances homicide is a class B to chapter 9A.20

- What cases are being prosecuted under this statute and how often have they resulted in a conviction?
- What evidence needs to be present to move forward with prosecuting a crime under this statute? What elements influence the choice to prosecute?

- · Are fatal overdoses higher or lower in counties that more frequently prosecute individuals under this statute? Does it have a deterrent effect?
- · Are there other factors in those areas that negate that effect?
